

# Merstham Primary school



## Admissions arrangements for September 2022/2023

Merstham Primary School is a one-form entry primary school in Merstham in Surrey. The school is part of the GLF Schools multi-academy trust, which runs a wide range of schools in South East England. Applications for a place at the school for September 2022 entry will need to be made through the Local Authority coordinated admissions process. GLF are the Admissions Authority for Merstham Primary School.

1. The Published Admission Numbers for Merstham Primary School for 2022 admission is 30
2. Applications for admission at the normal intake will be managed in accordance with Surrey's coordinated scheme on primary admission. Please see Surrey's coordinated scheme on the Surrey County Council website for further details regarding applications, processing, offers, late applications, post-offer and waiting lists.
3. Applications for Reception places must be made by 15<sup>th</sup> January 2022. Places at Surrey primary schools will be offered on the basis of the preferences that are shown on the application form. Parents will be asked to rank up to four preferences and these will be considered under an equal preference system.
4. Children with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) that names Merstham Primary School, will be allocated a place before other applicants are considered. In this way, the number of places available will be reduced by the number of children with an EHCP that has named the school.
5. When Merstham Primary School is over-subscribed for any year group, applications for entry in 2022/2023 will be ranked in the following order:

### **First priority: looked after and previously looked after children**

Within the admission arrangements for Merstham Primary School, looked after and previously looked after children will receive the top priority for a place. Looked after and previously looked after children will be considered to be:

- Children who are in the care of a local authority or provided with accommodation by a local authority in accordance with section 22 of the Children Act 1989, eg fostered or living in a children's home, at the time an application for a school is made; and
- Children who have previously been in the care of the local authority or provided with accommodation by a local authority, in accordance with section 22 of the Children Act 1989 and who have left that care through adoption, a child arrangements order (in accordance with section 8 of the Children's Act 1989 and as amended by the Children and Families Act (2014) or special guardianship order (in accordance with section 14A of the Children Act 1989).

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- Places will be allocated under this criterion when places are first offered at a school and the Local Authority may also ask schools to admit over their published admission number at other times under this criterion.

## **Second priority: exceptional social/medical need**

Occasionally there will be a very small number of children for whom exceptional social or medical circumstances will apply which will warrant a placement at a particular school. The exceptional social or medical circumstances might relate to either the child or the parent/carer. Supporting evidence from a professional is required such as a doctor and/or consultant for medical cases or a social worker, health visitor, housing officer, the police or probation officer for other social circumstances. This evidence must confirm the circumstances of the case and must set out why the child should attend a particular school and why no other school could meet the child's needs.

Providing evidence does not guarantee that a child will be given priority at a particular school and in each case a decision will be made based on the merits of the case and whether the evidence demonstrates that a placement should be made at one particular school above any other.

Common medical conditions or allergies can usually be supported in all mainstream schools, therefore priority under a school's exceptional medical criterion would not normally be given for these. Some mainstream schools have units attached, which provide specialist provision for children with either a Statement of Special Educational Needs or an Education Health and Care Plan, which names the school. The facilities in these units are not normally available to children in the mainstream school and as such, priority under a school's exceptional social or medical would not normally be agreed for a mainstream place on the basis of a specialist unit being attached to the school.

In addition, routine child minding would not normally be considered to be an exceptional social reason for placement at a particular school.

Places may be allocated under this criterion when places are first offered at a school and the Local Authority may also ask schools to admit over their published admission number at other times under this criterion.

## **Third priority: children who have a sibling at the school**

For Merstham Primary School, this criterion will only apply for children who will have a sibling at the school at the time of the child's admission.

A sibling will be considered to be a brother or sister (that is, another child of the same parents, whether living at the same address or not), a half-brother or half-sister or a step-brother or step-sister or an adoptive or foster sibling, living as part of the same family unit at the same address.

A child will be given sibling priority if they have a sibling on roll at the school concerned and that sibling is still expected to be on roll at the time of the child's admission.

## **Fourth priority: any other children**

Remaining places will be offered on the basis of nearness to the school measured in a straight line from the address point of the pupil's house, as set by Ordnance Survey to the nearest school gate for

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pupils to use. This is calculated using the Admissions and Transport Teams' Geographical Information System.

Where two or more children share a priority for a place, eg where two children live equidistant from a school and only one place remains, Surrey County Council will use random allocation to determine which child should be given priority (see section B).

If within this category there are more children than places available, any remaining places will be offered to children who have the smallest home to school distance.

The distance to the school is measured from the nearest of the three entry gates to the school.

From 1<sup>st</sup> September 2022 any applicant remaining on the waiting list will be considered to be an application for in year admission. After this date, when assessing the nearest school, schools with the appropriate year group will also be taken into account.

## Additional Information

### A. Home Address

Within the admission arrangements for Merstham Primary School, the child's home address excludes any business, or child minder's address and must be the child's normal place of residence. It also excludes any relative's address unless the child lives at that address as their normal place of residence'. Where the child is the subject to a child arrangements order and that order stipulates the child will live with one parent/carer more than the other, the address to be used will be the one where the child is expected to live for the majority of the time. For other children, the address to be used will be the address where the child lives the majority of the time. In other cases, where the child spends equal time between their parents/carers, it will be up to the parents to agree on which address to use. Where a child spends their time equally between their parents/carers and they cannot agree on who should make the application, we will accept an application from the parent/carer who is registered for child benefit. If neither parent is registered for child benefit we will accept the application from the parent/carer whose address is registered with the child's current nursery.

We will not generally accept a temporary address if the main carer of the child still possesses or rents a property that has previously been used as a home address, nor will we accept a temporary address if we believe it has been used solely or mainly to obtain a school place when an alternative address is still available to that child.'

All distances will be measured by the computerised Geographical Information System maintained by Surrey's Admissions Team.

The address to be used for the initial allocation of places to Reception will be the child's address at the closing date for application. Changes of address may be considered in accordance with Surrey's coordinated scheme if there are exceptional reasons behind the change, such as the family have just moved to the area. The address used for waiting lists, after the initial allocation,

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will be the child's current address. Any offer of place on the basis of address is conditional upon the child living at the appropriate address on the relevant date. Applicants have a responsibility to notify Surrey County Council of any change of address.

## **B. Tie breaker and the admission of twins, triplets, other multiple births or siblings born in the same academic year**

Where two or more children share a priority for a place when using distance as a tie breaker, eg where two children live equidistant from a school and only one place remains, Surrey County Council will draw lots to determine which child should be given priority.

In the case of multiple births, any child from a multiple birth will be offered a place if one child has already been offered a place and the subsequent child(ren) are ranked consecutively

## **C. Waiting List**

Where there more children than places available, waiting lists will operate for each year group according to the oversubscription criteria for each school without regard to the date the application was received or when a child's name was address to the list.

Waiting lists for the initial intake into Merstham Primary School will be maintained until the last day of the summer term 2023 when they will be cancelled. Parents wishing to remain on the waiting list after this date must write to Surrey County Council by 26<sup>th</sup> July 2023, stating their wish and providing their children's name, date of birth and the name their child's current school. After 26<sup>th</sup> July 2023, applicants whose children are not already on the waiting list but who wish them to be so must apply for in-year admission through Surrey County Council. Waiting lists for all year groups will be cancelled at the end of each academic year.

## **D. In-year admissions**

The following applications will be treated as in year admissions during 2022/2023:

- Applications for admission to Reception which are received after 1 September 2022
- All other applications for admission to years 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 & 6

Applications to Merstham Primary School must be made to the appropriate authority housing the official application form. Where there are more applications than places available, each application will be ranked in accordance with the published oversubscription criteria for each school.

## **E. Starting school**

Merstham Primary School has a single entry into Reception. All children whose date of birth falls between 1 September 2017 and 31<sup>st</sup> August 2018 will be eligible to apply for a full time place in Reception at a Surrey school for September 2022. Applicants can defer their child's entry to reception until later in the year, but this will not be agreed beyond the beginning of the term after the child's fifth birthday, not beyond the beginning of the final term of the academic year for which the offer was made. Applicants may also arrange for their child to start part time until their child reaches statutory school age.

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## F. The admission of children outside their chronological year group

Applicants may choose to seek a place outside their child's chronological (correct) year group. Decisions will be made on the basis of the circumstances of each case and what is in the best interest of the child concerned.

- Applicants who are applying for their child to have a decelerated entry for school, ie to start later than other children in their chronological year group, must initially apply for a school place in accordance with the deadlines that apply for their child's chronological age. If, in liaison with the head teacher, the local authority agrees for the child to have a decelerated entry into Merstham Primary School the place cannot be deferred and instead the applicant will be invited to apply again in the following year for the decelerated cohort.
- Applicants who are applying for their child to have an accelerated entry to school, ie to start earlier in their chronological year group, must initially apply for a school place at the same time that other families are applying for that cohort. If, in liaison with the head teacher, the local authority agrees for the child to have an accelerated entry to Merstham Primary School, the application will be processed. If it is not agreed for the child to have an accelerated entry to Merstham Primary School, the applicant will be invited to apply again in the following year for the correct cohort.

Applicants must state clearly why they feel admission to a different year group is in the child's best interest and provide what evidence they have to support this. ## G. Home to school transport

Surrey County Council has a Home to School transport policy that sets out the circumstances that children may qualify for free home to school transport.

Generally, transport will only be considered if a child is under 8 years old and is travelling more than two miles or is over 8 years old and travelling more than three miles to the nearest school with a place. Transport will not generally be provided to a school that is further away if a child would have been offered a place at a nearer school had it been named as a preference on the application form.

Eligibility to transport is not linked to the admissions criteria of a school. In considering admission criteria and school preferences it is important applicants also consider the home to school transport policy so that they might take account of the likelihood of receiving free transport to their preferred school before making their application. ## H. Providing false or misleading information

If an applicant is found to have supplied false or deliberately misleading information or to have withheld any relevant information, the local authority (Surrey County Council) reserves the right to withdraw any offer of a place, even if the child has already started at the school.

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
